New York, NY (December 12, 2024) – The Winter Show is excited to announce exhibitor and programming highlights ahead of its 71st edition at the Park Avenue Armory. Taking place January 24–February 2, 2025, the Show will feature rare and exceptional art and antiques from over 70 exhibitors, spanning from antiquity to today. With dealers from across

the Americas and Europe, the 2025 edition of The Winter Show will once again showcase the finest museum-quality works to an international audience of collectors, connoisseurs, and enthusiasts, alongside an acclaimed program of talks, panels, and events with leading experts in art, antiques, and design.

All ticket proceeds from the fair and its benefit events, including the **Opening Night Party** on January 23, sponsored by **Bank of America**, and **Young Collectors Night** on January 30, directly fund **East Side House Settlement**. **Chubb** returns as The Winter Show's presenting sponsor, celebrating 29 years of partnership and support.

Executive Director Helen Allen said, "With every edition of The Winter Show, we look forward to sharing the world-class works our dealers bring to the fair. This year, we are particularly pleased with the exciting range of works across periods, styles, cultures, and makers. We are proud to uphold our extremely high standards of excellence among our exhibitors, ensuring a selection of truly unique and remarkable works for collectors and fairgoers of every variety. As always, the experience will be enhanced by complementary programming featuring panels and lectures by experts across the fields of art and design."

The Winter Show maintains the most exacting standards of quality in the art market, and all objects are rigorously vetted for authenticity and condition. Each work on display at the Show undergoes thorough examination by over 120 specialists across 30 disciplines to assess authenticity, quality, and value, ensuring excellence in standards and authoritative transparency for collectors and clients.

Exhibitor Highlights for The Winter Show 2025

This year, The Show will exhibit a wide variety of works, including paintings, sculptures, tapestries, books, furniture, jewelry, and design objects.

Exhibitor highlights include:

- Robert Young Antiques (London, UK) presents a drawing of a sailboat made by a young King Charles III while a pupil at Cheam School circa 1957.
- Daniel Crouch Rare Books (London, UK; New York, USA) exhibits a selection from the world's largest collection of playing cards, held by the French artist Jean Verame; the display includes a deck from the 12th century, uncut sheets of cards from 1480, and a transparent Surrealist deck of cards.
- Bernard Goldberg Fine Arts, LLC (New York, USA) will bring an assortment of rare works by Auguste Rodin, Antoine Bourdelle, Henri Matisse, and other major modernists.

- **Lillian Nassau LLC** (New York, USA) featuring a selection of works by Tiffany Studios glass, including an exceptional stained-glass window depicting a lush bouquet of peonies.
- **Hirschl & Adler Galleries** (New York, USA) will present a major work by German American artist Winold Reiss, which coincides with the gallery's survey exhibition of the artist's evocative portraits from the first half of the 20th-century.
- Thomas Heneage Art Books (London, UK) will show a unique antique clock made from duck eggs, which measures not only time but also phases of the moon and the schedule of the tide.
- Alexandre Gallery (New York, USA) features works by major American modernists including Stuart Davis, Charles Demuth, and Charles Sheeler.
- Wartski (London, UK) shows fine antique jewelry and decorative objects, including a rare silver cigar cutter in the shape of a carp, produced by Carl Fabergé.
- **Kunsthandel Nikolaus Kolhammer** (Vienna, AT) exhibits a mantle clock designed by Josef Hoffmann in 1903, the founding year of Wiener Werkstätte; only two such clocks were produced.
- **Didier Ltd** (London, UK) features jewelry designed by 20th-century masters like Alexander Calder, including a silver tiara designed for Rose Masson, wife of the French artist André Masson.
- São Roque (Lisbon, PT) presents 18th-century sculptures from the Benedictine Monastery of Saint Mary of Pombeiro, attributed to master sculptor Friar José de Santo António Ferreira Vilaça and later acquired by filmmaker José Leitão de Barros.
- **Véronique Bamps** (Monaco) features fine jewelry from the 19th and 20th centuries, including a Castellani archaeological-style choker of gold leaves and bunches of white grapes in glass paste from 1870.
- Cove Landing (New York, USA) stages an early 19th-century period room, including a collection of 27 watercolors of interiors and a rare surviving pair of German Biedermeier cabinets.
- **Elle Shushan** (Philadelphia, USA) exhibits a pair of extremely rare prints depicting King George III and Queen Charlotte of Great Britain, originally made to celebrate their 1761 coronation.
- Les Enluminures (Chicago and New York, USA; Paris, France) shows dual exhibitions in their booth, including "Crosses as Jewelry: Ancient Symbol, Timeless Style" and "In Her Hands: Women and Medieval Manuscripts." A highlight includes an Italian devotional pendant with scenes of the Annunciation and Crucifixion (c. 1500) rendered in gold, enamel, and agate.
- **Jonathan Boos** (New York, USA) exhibits a special presentation on 20th-century modernism, featuring a sculpture by Richmond Barthé, the preeminent sculptor of the Harlem Renaissance.

- **Peter Harrington** (London, UK) displays a rare collection of 11 works in 43 volumes from 1830 by John Gould, "the Bird Man," a noted illustrator and taxidermist whose many scientific samples influenced Charles Darwin's theory of natural selection.
- Eguiguren Arte de Hispanoamérica (Buenos Aires, Argentina) presents a rare painting by Spanish Baroque painter Juan van der Hamen y León (1596–1631).
- David A. Schorsch and Eileen M. Smiles American Antiques (Woodbury, CT, USA) exhibits rare objects from the 19th and early 20th centuries, including a miniature blanket chest dating from 1830–40, which retains its original wallpaper covering, cardboard drawer fronts, and brass hardware.
- Rountree Tryon Galleries (Petworth, UK) shows a 1918 oil painting by Sir Alfred James Munnings that was gifted to Princess Alice, Countess of Athlone, a granddaughter of Queen Victoria, by the Canadian Forestry Corps after the First World War.
- Aronson Antiquairs of Amsterdam (Amsterdam, Netherlands) shows a blue and white Delftware chinoiserie jug mounted in silver, produced circa 1670 and presented as a gift to celebrate the marriage of the affluent Ytje Calmes and Gerrit Beckeringh in 1678.
- **Hixenbaugh Ancient Art** (New York, USA) brings priceless antiquities from ancient Greek and Rome, as well as ancient Egyptian objects including a gilt wood mummy mask from the Late Dynastic Period (c. 664–32 BC).
- Milord Antiquités (Montreal, Canada) presents European and American modernist furniture, including a frequently cited red lacquered sideboard by Jules Leleu, dating from 1960, and an acid-etched, patinated-bronze and pewter "Chan Li" cabinet by Philip and Kelvin LaVerne.
- **Galerie Léage** (Paris, France) features a set of drawers attributed to cabinetmaker Adam Weisweiler, which belonged to Archchancellor Jean-Jacques Régis de Cambacérès at the Hôtel d'Elbeuf in the early 19th century.
- **Hollis Taggart** (New York, USA) presents *MENAND III*, a lacquered steel sculpture by renowned American Abstract Expressionist David Smith (1906–1965).
- **Jeffrey Tillou Antiques** (Litchfield, CT, USA) highlights rare pieces of Americana, including a copper weather vane rendered as a four-masted sailing vessel, purportedly once mounted atop a building in the famed Shiverick Shipyard in Dennis, Massachusetts.

FOCUS: Americana

Returning this year is the special exhibition *FOCUS: Americana*, celebrating Americana design history and showcasing a selection of exceptional early American fine art, folk art, and antiques. Curated by *Alexandra Kirtley*, the Montgomery-Garvan Curator of American Decorative Arts at the *Philadelphia Museum of Art*, with exhibition design by *Erick J. Espinoza*, Creative Director of *Anthony Baratta*, the exhibition features essential,

The Winter Show

The Winter Show is the longest-running fair in America devoted to fine art, antiques, and design. Since it began in 1954, the Show has been the annual benefit for East Side House Settlement, a community-based organization serving the Bronx and Northern Manhattan. Along with its important fundraising mission, the Show has become a highlight event of New York City's social calendar.

The Winter Show will bring over 70 exhibitors together for the 2025 fair, presenting a wide variety of works ranging from paintings, sculpture, and works on paper to fine furniture, jewelry, silver, rare books, and contemporary ceramics and glass.

As always, the Show maintains the most exacting standards of quality in the art market, and all objects are rigorously vetted for authenticity and condition. Each work on display at the Show undergoes a thorough examination by over 120 specialists across 30 disciplines to assess its authenticity, quality, and value. This process typically includes verifying the piece's provenance, evaluating its condition, and determining its historical and artistic significance. The goal of the vetting process is not only to set an example of excellence in standards but also to provide an authoritative transparency to collectors and clients.

All revenue from the fair's general admissions and the net proceeds from the Opening Night Party and other special events benefit East Side House Settlement and contribute substantially to its community programming. No part of sales made by exhibitors is received by East Side House.

The Winter Show is held at the Park Avenue Armory, located at 67th Street and Park Avenue in New York City. General admission is \$30 with early-bird pricing and \$40 beginning January 10. Prices include a copy of the Show's award-winning catalogue.

Design Council Co-Chairs

Christine Gachot is a founder and principal of the interdisciplinary design studio GACHOT, a hospitality development consultant, a board member of the Design Leadership Network, a Brand Ambassador for NeueHouse, and a founding member of the Female Design Council. Prior to launching GACHOT together with John Gachot, she worked with André Balazs Properties (ABP) as a partner in the role of Vice President of Design Development. There, she led the design and development of iconic hotels and commercial residential projects including Hotel QT, the Standard New York, 40 Mercer Residences, One Kenmare Square, and the Chiltern Firehouse. Before working with ABP, Christine Gachot worked as a Senior

Designer at Studio Sofield for 10 years on numerous commercial and residential projects, including the Soho and Tribeca Grand Hotels and Gucci Worldwide.

John Gachot is a founder and principal of GACHOT. He has been working as an interior architect and designer in New York City since 1996, leading the design and project development of high-end residential, retail, commercial, and restaurant spaces. His experience ranges from branding and art direction to architectural design. John Gachot's work includes Marc Jacobs's private New York residence, Bottega Veneta, Baker Furniture, Boucheron jewelry, and Gucci stores, as well as numerous high-end residential projects in Aspen, Seattle, Chicago, the Caribbean, and beyond. Prior to GACHOT, he worked at several prominent ateliers, including Studio Sofield as a Senior Designer and Thad Hayes as Design Director.

Elizabeth Graziolo is the founder and principal of Yellow House Architects, a collaborative-minded practice based in New York City and Miami. She has been honored with the Museum of the City of New York's City of Design Award and the prestigious Cooper Union President's Citation in Architecture, and Architectural Digest profiled her as "One to Watch." Graziolo is an AD Pro, an Architectural Digest AD100 honoree for three years running, and an Elle Decor A-Lister. A trustee of the Institute of Classical Architecture & Art, the Museum of the City of New York, and the Olana Partnership, Graziolo also serves on the Delano & Aldrich/Emerson Fellowship Committee of the American Institute of Architects. Recent projects include townhouses and a mixed-use condominium on New York City's Upper East Side, private estates in the Midwest and Palm Beach, a house renovation in Turks and Caicos, and the design of an entire agriculture-focused neighborhood in Georgia.

David Netto is a Los Angeles-based interior designer and writer. He has written on architecture and design for the *Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Times*, *Cabana*, and other publications, and he currently writes the "Case Studies" column for *Town & Country*. He is the author of monographs on François Catroux and Stephen Sills, and his interiors have appeared in *Vogue*, *Elle Decor*, *Architectural Digest*, *House Beautiful*, *House & Garden*, *Town & Country*, and *Veranda*. In 2023, Vendome published a book representing 20 years of his designs.
